#### TREASURER'S REPORT

Earnings from the Stockman's Dinner, Trail Ride, memberships, grants, and our calf crop was sufficient to meet our operating costs. Casino money was used to purchase the classy sign at the junction of Highways 22, and 540. The next Casino will be held next year on March 20th and 21st, 2015. A grant was received from Foothills Community Support Services and was used in support of our newsletter, and volunteers.

Special thanks to Maxine Nelson & Carole Hergert – Friends; Rose Dayment – Payroll; Liz Hergert bookkeeping; and Steven Muth – accounting (Muth & Company donate half their fee every year). Thank you Parks Canada for allowing us to use the Pierson House as our office – and all the staff for mowing, shoveling, and other maintenance.

#### BAR U LEGACY FUND By: Doug Longson

The Bar U Legacy Fund is an endowment fund managed for us by The Calgary Foundation. The income from this fund (\$1,858 this year) is used to support the Heritage Ranch Rodeo (prizes, advertising) – our main event – which showcases historical ranching practices.

An endowment fund (currently \$49,782) is a registered fund that never spends the capital contribution but generates income through investments. Annually, a percentage of the income (4% currently) is distributed to the Friends, and the balance is re-invested in the fund. This way the fund continues to grow, and the gift keeps on giving in greater amounts every year.

The fund is managed by The Calgary Foundation (ten year compound return 7.2%), a non-profit foundation which currently manages over 100 funds for charitable organizations. This ensures that only the income will be available to the Friends; there will never be access to the capital in the fund.

The 2014 trail ride took place on the Spruce Ranch on Aug 2. It was a great success with 56 participants. Thanks to Joe and Sherrine Engelhart for leading the ride through the hills. Charlotte Esser, John Esser, Brian Garstin, Margaret Garstin, Tamara Garstin, Warren Webber and two helpful young veterinarians volunteered for the day. The ride generated \$2700 in income.

#### CATTLE COMMITTEE REPORT

A black Limousin bull was purchased for \$3500 from Highland Stock farms and was turned out with the cows on June 30th. 30 calves were sold at Stavely Auction on Oct 6th. 13 heifer calves averaged 600 lbs, and brought \$1558 each. 16 steer calves averaged 605 pounds, and brought \$1656 each. 1 longhorn weighed 405 pounds, and brought .95cents/pound.

54 bales of hay were produced, and 78 bales were purchased. This should be enough feed.

#### BAR U RANCH SITE MANAGER'S REPORT

The Bar U Ranch drew in record attendance this past season with over 19,000 people visiting the National Historic Site in 2014. That's 3,500 more than last year and 2,000 up on our previous record set in 2012. Thank you to the staff, volunteers and community members who helped us achieve this number as we continue to give visitors an inside look at Canada's rich ranching heritage.

It has been another year of change at the Bar U. After the flood of 2013 we thought anything to follow would be easy, but challenges continue. According to the Chinese calendar, last year was the year of the water snake. This is the year of the horse and it has been more auspicious for the ranch. Going forward, we want to continue to swing those double gates wider and further increase our visitation and revenue. At the same time we want to conserve, restore and continue to connect visitors with nature. That is our challenge.

Banners for the Bar U this year included: hosting the War of 1812 exhibit, a Bar U display at the Cave and Basin in Banff, a Sidesaddle clinic that boasted the largest collection of ladies mounted aside in North America, a return to the Calgary Stampede Parade and Draft Horse Town, an appearance of the Strathcona Mounted Troop at the Ranch Rodeo to commemorate one hundred years since the start of World War 1, a successful horse powered harvest of a rye crop destined to be bottled in Turner Valley and the Root Cellars return to its former glory. The Bar U as part of the Waterton Field Unit was the recipient of a 2014 Parks Canada CEO award for its response to the 2013 flood. As well we continued with our regular events and interpretation programs that seem so run of the mill to us but continue to amaze visitors from home and from around the world.

Next season marks 20 years since the Bar U Ranch opened as a National Historic Site. We will be celebrating this milestone in the new season while continuing flood recovery work and working to develop and maintain this unique national Historic Site. I hope to see you all in 2015.
