Cowboy and Western Heritage Museum. George Lane was an incredible man, having come up from the States as a cowhand, managing the Bar U Ranch then eventually owning it and making a huge mark in the agricultural industry with not only being a prominent cattle rancher, but running a large farming operation, raising and showing the best Percherons in the world, being involved in cattle politics, and being one of the 'Big Four' instrumental in starting the Calgary Stampede. George Lane Jr. and other descendants stood on the stage and accepted a bronze and a plaque honoring Mr. Lane. Our federal MP, John Barlow, submitted a video highlighting Mr. Lane for the nomination process, and the crowd at the banquet gave John a standing ovation after the video played! It was an incredible event.

BAR U LEGACY FUND

The Bar U Legacy Fund is an endowment fund managed for us by The Calgary Foundation. The income from this fund (\$4,201 this year) is used to support the Heritage Ranch Rodeo (prizes, advertising) - our main event - which showcases historical ranching practices.

An endowment fund (current balance \$112, 300) is a registered fund that never spends the capital contribution but generates income through investments. Annually, a percentage of the income (4% currently) is distributed to the Friends, and the balance is re-invested in the fund. This way the fund continues to grow, and the gift keeps on giving in greater amounts every year. Donations to the fund this year totaled \$5,320, comprised of \$3,020 from donation boxes on site, and \$2,300 from functions held on site. The fund is managed by The Calgary Foundation (ten year compound return 7.2%), a non-profit foundation which currently manages over 100 funds for charitable organizations. This ensures that only the income will be available to the Friends; there will never be access to the capital in the fund. Ways to give:

- **Designations** in wills or trust.
- Bequests of life insurance policies, real property, stocks and bonds.

The paper work was completed for a temporary field authorization that was required by the Alberta Government. Gordon led us through a beautiful portion of their ranch and explained many of the aspects of the native grassland. There were 51 people in total, 11 riding in the wagon. The wagon was handled very capably by Ross Fritz. No major incidents or injuries occurred, despite various wasp nests. Mother Nature co-operated by holding off the rain for the day. Volunteers included Brian and Tamara Garstin, Christine Nolette, Avril and Clay Chattaway, Wayne and Karen Ritchie, and Christine

Longson DVM. The lunches were ordered from Rusty Spur Catering, and everyone enjoyed them. The Trail Ride showed a profit of \$3220.

CATTLE COMMITTEE REPORT By: Brian Garstin

16 heifer calves and 15 steer calves were sold on October 7, 2016 at Foothills Auction, Stavely. They brought \$28,371.00. The heifer calves averaged 533lbs @ \$156.66/cwt. The steer calves averaged 578lbs @ \$182.75/cwt. The calves were sold with the Friends' new brand, U7 over half diamond on the Right Rib. Thanks to Bart and Rosemary who graciously donated the brand to the Friends. One black bull was sold in August, as well as 2 dry cows and 1 cull cow. There are currently 27 commercial cows in the herd, plus 2 longhorn cows. Current plans are to purchase 3 younger cows in November, and a new bull in the spring. We have 142 round bales of greenfeed from the 2016 year, and 60 2-year old bales of greenfeed. This should be more than enough to winter the cows.

This year's Ranch Rodeo was a great success. It was a beautiful sunny day in the foothills and the "Mighty Bar U Ranch" provided the perfect setting for a rodeo! The day started with our Pekisko Creek Trade Fair and Art Show which ran from 10am-5pm. This was the second year for the trade fair; we had 12 vendors plus the Bar U Gift Shop! At the request of the vendors from last year, parks staff re-located the tents to be closer to the arena. This was very well received, as the exhibitors found the crowds taking a break from the hot sun to come over and visit. Special thanks to all the parks staff for providing assistance to "The Friends" in so many ways to make this day is possible. This was the second year for the Ranch Horse Competition as well, which started at 10am. All 12 teams sent their top ranch horse to participate in the event, with points going towards their final score in the rodeo. Jessica Manning announced the morning performance. Peter Swales judged the event; he presented Jared Sherman of Soderglen Ranch with a one of a kind handcrafted buckle made by Peter himself.

BAR U RANCH SITE MANAGER'S REPORT By: Travis Weber

The site hosted over twenty-three thousand visitors in 2016. This is a record breaking year for the site and an impressive accomplishment that everyone should be proud of.

This year we tried out some new events in addition to our regular schedule of special events. The Hometown Heroes special event weekend and display commemorated World War One and the

contributions of the Bar U Ranch and this region towards the effort on the front lines and at home. The Cowboy Concert and Stargazing events provided new ways for Canadians to experience the site. We were able to celebrate 100 years of Women's right to vote with some special programs in our Cookhouse. Our two biggest events at the site, Ranch Rodeo and Canada Day, continue to increase in popularity; both

boasted over one thousand visitors.

We are making progress on the Federal Infrastructure Investment that was announced in 2015. The contract for work on the Machine Shed, Slaughterhouse, and Studhorse Barn has been awarded and a majority of the work will be completed this winter. Some painting and final touches will be ongoing into May and June of next year's season. This important work will open new opportunities for messaging about the evolution of machinery, and the story of self-sustainability at the Bar U Ranch.



We are now beginning work on Phase II of the Federal Infrastructure Investment. This phase will include the Work Horse Barn and Bunkhouse/Self Feeder. The winter will be used to understand and plan for the construction, the construction itself is scheduled to begin in the fall of 2017.

This year we administered a Visitor Information Program. Surveys were distributed to six hundred visitors. The VIP provides staff and managers with information about the profile of on-site visitors, such as their demographic characteristics (e.g., age, origin, group size), visit characteristics (e.g., length of stay, visit frequency), and use and satisfaction with various products, programs and services. In addition, it provides information about specific issues of interest (e.g., information sources used to decide to visit, use of specific amenities etc.). This data will help us to understand who our visitors are and why they are coming to the Bar U Ranch.

Looking towards the 2017 season, we are busy planning activities to celebrate the 150th birthday of Canada. This will include the Hometown Heroes and Cowboy Concert events continuing, but we are also hoping to include a larger scope of

activities on Canada Day and new programs like a Whiskey Tasting Tour, Learn to Camp program, and a new culinary experience. Parks Canada is expecting an influx of visitors due to the free entry initiative and we welcome the opportunity at the Bar U Ranch!

The experiences we provide and the conservation work that is done on our iconic buildings and landscape is not a small undertaking. It's quite complex, and doing it right and doing it well requires an incredible amount of collaboration with an incredible group of people. Over the year I've seen first-hand the dedication and passion that you all bring to the table and it truly is awe inspiring.



A big thank you to the Friends of the Bar U Historic Ranch Association, the volunteers, staff, and special guests for your commitment and enthusiasm. Without your support we couldn't achieve the excellence that the Bar U is known for. You make the Bar U Ranch an amazing place to be.

We have had a major donation by a gentleman from Priddis area who lives on an old dairy farm that his family operated from the early 1900's. Part of the

donation is an old Cook Car, with the original undercarriage in place, which has been moved onto the ranch site. Many other articles from this donation have been placed in the Root Cellar, to depict how food from the gardens was stored for the winter.

We also received a large Map of Alberta (dated 1904), which has been framed and is now hanging in the Visitor's Centre. This was certainly the year for interesting donations, not the least of which was a large collection of Barbed Wire! This was first introduced into the west by George Lane, and we have 22 wall hangings with numerous types of wire mounted on canvas. This is a spectacular collection, and we are looking forward to having it displayed in the Visitor's Centre as well.
