An endowment fund is a registered fund that never spends the capital contribution but generates income through investments. Annually, a percentage of the income is distributed to the Friends, and the balance is re-invested in the fund. This way the fund continues to grow, and the gift keeps on giving in greater amounts every year. CATTLE COMMITTEE REPORT

On behalf of The Friends of The Bar U we thank Stephen Hughes for his past work and guidance building the Friends cattle herd and implementing the Verified Beef Production Plus program.



CATTLE

We started the year with 31 cows and one bull. One cow lost her calf and one of our other calves went missing at the end of August. We sold 29 calves in total on September 30th at the Fort Macleod Auction. 20

steers at an Avg-wt of 542lbs, 9 Heifers at an Avg-wt of 514lbs **Total: \$32,224.43**

Our five-year old bull came up lame four days into the breeding season, however we had a back-up plan in case this happened. We purchased another Polled Hereford bull in June and it was delivered immediately so the cows were never without a bull in the pasture. This new bull earned his keep as he bred every cow in the herd. We will be shipping one older cow. This will leave us with 29 head and we plan on buying three more second calvers during the first week of November. All sale proceeds from the lame bull and two cows will go back into purchasing replacements. Three red angus cows were purchased in November as replacements, bringing our cow herd to 32 head of mixed black and red Angus.

HAY

There was a major drought this summer; the Bar U baled only 72 bales compared to 300 last year. The Friends get half of 72 = 36 + 6 carry over bales from last year. We ended up purchasing 140 bales, which will give us a total of 182.



Our president, Ken Chatel has completed our application to the Agriculture Financial Services Corporation for the Feed Assistance Program. We will have an update on our application later in November/December. Big thanks to Patrick and crew for all of their hard work this past year. It has been a pleasure to work with Dylan and all of the Parks Canada employees.

Our 12 teams all did a great job. The winning team, the Duce Ranch from Magrath, scored 44 points out of a possible 48, which is one of the best scores we have ever seen. With the exception of one added member (who sadly missed the photo shoot!), the team is all from one family. Second place went to Parkview Ranches of Wetaskiwin, third place to the Rough Riders from Waterton, and in fourth place was Soderghen Ranches from Airdrie. All the competitors had very positive things to say about the rodeo, and they all hope to come back next year.





The Stoney Nakoda Games Relay Race during intermission was a new addition this year, and was a huge hit with the crowd! It was a wonderful presentation, and we hope to make this a regular part of the rodeo in years to come if possible.

Project work will include water upgrades, building projects, estimates on restoration work for buildings, replacing some signs and doing design work on exhibits. Other interesting projects include the ongoing development of a restoration monitoring APP, accommodation offer research, and footbridge design. What does next year look like? Like many other businesses and organizations, next year will likely be a reset for us. We hope to start off with a longer training for staff, an earlier opening of the café, early season school groups, the same special events with the possibility of some new ones and making more people aware of all the Bar U has to offer. It's an exciting time as we look to bring ourselves into a post pandemic future.

But most significantly we received several items completed by Roland Gissing and these are on display in the new Gallery in the Visitor Information Centre. Be sure to check it all out next spring.

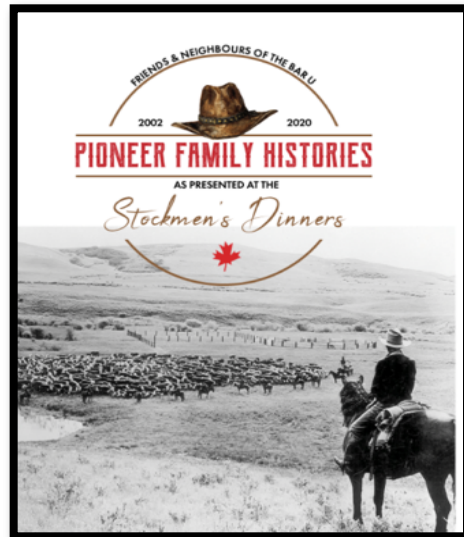
