Due to Rose Dayment's retirement from the Friends, I have taken over the payroll duties which has been a challenge. On our payroll last year we had 7 employees throughout the summer. Thank you to Rose for the great training!

As we approach our year end for the Friends, I have to say that financially we have had a successful year. In February, we were lucky enough to have a Casino. Thanks to a small and diligent group of volunteers we netted almost \$32,000. This money will come in handy to support our cattle operation and our ranch rodeo.

Another source of income was our Pioneer Histories book which continues to sell. We did a third printing in the spring and have great local businesses that carry our books for us. Our cattle operation was strong this year and proceeds were close to 30% higher than 2021. We also received a grant from our Bar U Legacy fund which continues to grow and our grants are more each year. This year we received \$12,102.

We also received a FCSS grant from Foothills County to enhance our volunteer program.

Our major expense continues to be hay for the cattle. Fortunately, we have a great partnership with Parks Canada and they help us with this cost.

Once again, I would like to thank Kathy Hergert our office manager, Carole Hergert who looks after the Gift Shop, and our accountants Liz Hergert and Steven Muth at Transcend LLP.



BAR U LEGACY FUND

The Bar U Legacy Fund is an endowment fund managed for us by The Calgary Foundation. The income from this fund is used to support the Ranch Rodeo - our main event - which showcases historical ranching practices. An endowment fund is a registered fund that never spends the capital contribution but generates income through investments. Annually, a percentage of the income is distributed to the Friends, and the balance is re-invested in the fund. This way the fund continues to grow, and the gift keeps on giving in greater amounts every year. RESTORATION COMMITTEE REPORT

A big thank you to Patrick, Shane, Wayne, Paul, and everyone else who does so much to keep our equipment functioning - you are all very appreciated.

The Mercury Truck had a new starter installed which didn't last too long and it is in the process of being replaced with a somewhat revised version which hopefully will last longer. Sixty-year-old parts are hard to come by nowadays but where there is a will there's a way! The Merc also needs a spring replaced on the frame and both it and the Dodge need maintenance done, all of which should happen by next summer.

We have a volunteer that would help with the assembly of the TD14 International Bulldozer this winter, the same volunteer helped Shane with the disassembly for a day last year along with sourcing parts. A pump stand for the newly restored clearview Wayne Fuel Pump will also be a winter project for Patrick.

Maintenance has been done on the 930 Case Tractor but it still has some leaks that need repair. A new water pump was put on the firewagon and the water truck will be needing a new pump as well. The bunk car needs a tin roof and a drip edge to reduce maintenance caused from moisture. The individual doing the repair on the Maytag Washing Machine is unable to continue so he is labeling and bagging the parts and sending a jump drive showing the disassembly of the washer. We have a volunteer to overhaul the Maytag gas engine, but still need a volunteer for the remainder of the restoration.

Wayne and Paul rebuilt one cattle oiler, the stone boat, and the blue wagon. There are two more wagons slated to be repaired next season. Still on the wish list is a bigger gooseneck trailer and the repair of the single stroke engine (needs a gas tank), which could be put on a flat deck to run a buck saw, cut wood and other projects, more interesting ranching history for visitors to view. Thanks again restoration crew, for all you do! Keeping all the equipment in working condition requires a lot of maintenance.



CATTLE COMMITTEE REPORT

We started the year with 32 cows and one bull. We ended up with a set of twins, 33 calves in total. One of the twins

became orphaned and under the care of Patrick, Parks staff, Megan and her two children, "Touques" has become a star attraction at the Bar U. Touques will remain under the care of the Parks staff and continue his role welcoming all visitors to the Bar U.

Our calves sold at the Fort Macleod Auction on September 29th. 32 calves were sold, as compared to 29 in 2021, which showed a 10% increase in the herd. Average weight: 543 lbs., up 15lbs from 2021 - 3% increase from 2021. Average price/head: \$1386, up \$309 from 2021 - 27% increase. Average price/pound \$2.55, up .51 from 2021 - 25% increase. Net Proceeds - \$44,950 vs \$32,224 in 2021 - 39.5% increase



We preg tested cows on October 11th. We had three open cows out of 32. We will ship open cows this fall and possibly replace them with

either heifers or second calvers depending on prices. We will keep the herd close to 30 head.

Hay:

The dry weather continued into 2022, however we did get some much-needed moisture early in the spring which helped with our overall yield. The Bar U baled

110 bales of hay this year. The Friends get half, which is 55 bales. We had a carryover of 65 bales from last year, and we purchased another 126. Total bales going into winter 246. We also purchased 42 bales of straw.

Farmland:

The Parks farmland is coming on 8 years old next year and producing less each year. Our plan is to break up around 90 acres late next year after haying and following up with seeding and fertilizing in the spring of 2024.

We would like to thank Patrick Davis and the Parks staff for all of their hard work looking after our herd this year. Special thanks to Megan and her two children for taking such great care of the calf, Touques.

SITE MANAGER'S REPORT

We kicked off the 2022 season with our new Visitor Experience & Site Manager, Megan Hjorleifson. Megan came to us from the Cave and Basin, has worked with Parks Canada since 2009, and started her Parks career as a student interpreter here at the Bar U Ranch National Historic Site in 2000.

Highlights of the season:

Parks Canada - Blacksmith Workshop took place here at the Bar U Ranch in early May. Terry Danyleyko, Historical Restoration Craftsperson, led the workshop for many of the Bar U Ranch staff. They learned how to run a coal forge, make coke out of coal, square nails, hooks, fire pokers, and other giveaways. Thank you to Patrick Davis for putting the workshop together.

One of the most important events of the season was the Historic Site and Monuments Board of Canada and the Government of Canada recognition of John Ware as a person of national historic significance with a plaque unveiling on June 6, 2022.

National historic designations encourage us to acknowledge both the triumphs and the struggles that have led us to the Canada of today and help us reflect on how to build a more inclusive society for today and future generations.

The Honourable Randy Boissonnault, Minister of Tourism, Associate Minister of Finance, and Member of Parliament for Edmonton Centre, announced the designation of John Ware as a person of national historic significance under the National Program of Historical Commemoration, on behalf of the Honourable Steven Guilbeault, Minister of Environment and Climate Change and Minister responsible for Parks Canada. The designation was commemorated with a special ceremony to unveil a plaque at Bar U Ranch National Historic Site.

Canada honours the resilience, innovation, and determination of black people and recognizes the major contributions they have made, and continue to make, in all sectors of society.

John Ware (ca. 1855 – 1905)



John Ware was a black cowboy who forged a successful ranching career despite racism, rough frontier conditions and having been enslaved. After entering the District of Alberta in 1882 on a trail crew driving thousands of cattle to the site of the Bar U Ranch, he wrangled the herds of large ranching outfits before building his own ranch with his wife Mildred and their children. He achieved success in a white-dominated industry largely controlled by well-financed corporations. Ware's generosity and superior skill as a cowboy earned him an enduring reputation and a prominent place in the mythology of the Canadian West.



John Barlow, MP Foothills, hosted a Canadian Citizenship Ceremony on Saturday, August 13 at the Bar U Ranch. There were over 200 guests with 50-plus people becoming Canadian Citizens. They couldn't have picked a more wonderful day at the Bar U! We look forward to this being an annual event in the Foothills!

COLLECTIONS COMMITTEE REPORT By: Ken Chatel


It has been a quiet year on the donation front but what we did receive were unique artifacts. Our focus continues to be on artifacts that represent the ranching life here on the prairies. The Friends' Collection currently has over 3000 items donated by 230 donors. We have placed some of these donations in 31 different places on the Bar U property. These donations help the Bar U tell the story of the ranching history in Alberta.

In 2022 we received: A Horse drawn hay press; restored gas pump; a pump organ owned by Pat Burns; a Fresno; a Munson Metal Cutter; a 4-horse evener; a sheepherder's saddle; and several other small items.

The gallery in the Visitor Orientation Centre was set-up with numerous paintings, model trains and a saddle from the Roland Gissing estate. It was a great display that was enjoyed by all our visitors. Several of the prints and paintings have been donated and will be available at our Stockman's Dinner silent auction in January, 2023.

Over several years we had recorded interviews with families and early pioneers on what their lives were like. These old tapes have been digitized with help from the Glenbow Museum and the University of Calgary. We are now looking at getting them transcribed so the histories can be accessible to anyone doing research or interested in our pioneers.

We thank all our donors for thinking of the Bar U for their special items. Please contact us if you have items that represent early ranch history, we would love to see if they would help tell the story of ranching at the Bar U.
